

The Western Wall was a supporting wall of the Temple Mount.

It is one of the only remnants from the Temple period in Jerusalem.

The Temple was a spiritual center for the Jewish people and was destroyed twice. Because of this, even though the Western Wall is not a remnant of the Temple itself, it became a symbol of the Jewish people: just as the Western Wall survived the turmoil of history, so too the Jewish people is eternal.
